Doctrine of Privity of Contract and consideration; essentials and exceptions, Capacity to contract [Section 10-12]: Incapacity arising out of status and mental defect, Minor's agreement- definition of minor, agreements beneficial and detrimental to a minor, ratification in cases by a person of an agreement made by him while he was a minor; "necessaries" supplied to a minor.
